

THE KIDS PROGRAM

Enlightening's formal programming for Kids is designed for students ages 5 through 8, and it emphasizes taking care of ourselves and the world around us. The curriculum is a blend of arts and sciences to feed our brains and imagination, with a little outdoor recreation to keep our bodies healthy, too. All of it wizard-style, of course!

Kids are divided into two groups – 1st Years and 2nd Years – for some classes to allow for a more hands-on learning experience and age-appropriate instruction. Your group assignment is given during the check-in process on Thursday. A Prefect will be assigned to each group and will remain with that group during all formal programming hours (9am–12pm and 2pm–5pm). Parents sign in Kids with their designated Prefect during morning announcements in the E7 Common Room (8:45am) and sign them out between 11:50–12pm for lunch break. For the afternoon sessions, the sign-in time will be between 1:45–2pm, and sign-out will be between 4:50–5pm, always in the E7 Common Room. **Please be on time for Sign-In/Out so as not to disrupt classes.**
